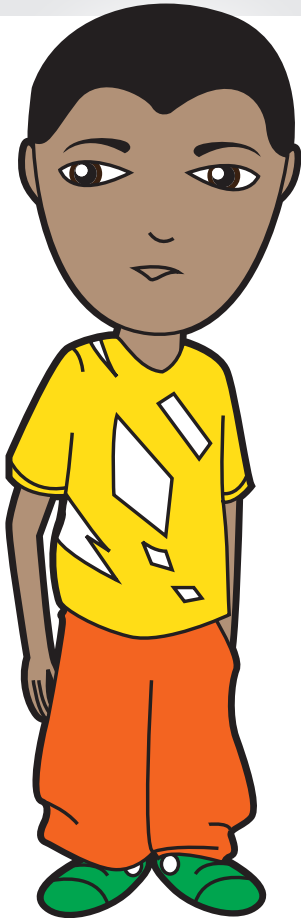

## Speaking to Elders



Bu or Ibu can mean “mum” but is also used as a term of respect for women.



Pak or Bapak can mean “dad” but is also used as a term of respect for men.

## Siapa nama kamu

We have learnt that “Siapa nama Anda?” means “What is your name?” This a formal way of asking. For example if you were talking to someone older.

The less formal way to ask someone’s name is “Siapa nama kamu?” or “Siapa namamu”. “Mu” is the shortened form of “kamu” which means “you”. You would use this for people the same age as you.

## Song

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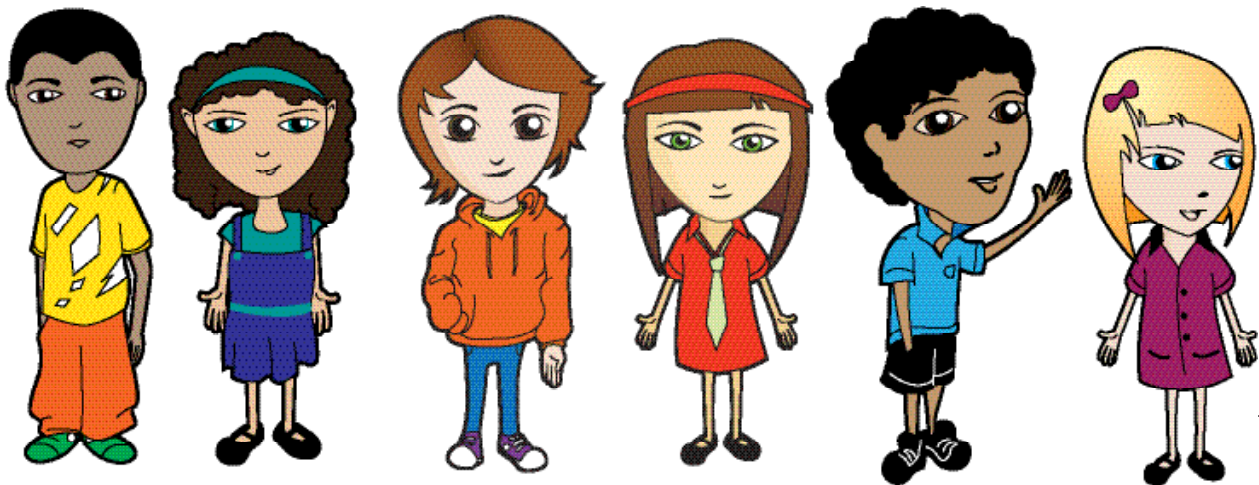
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The "Lagu" or "Song" had these new words in it:
